Our priests dedicate their lives in service to the Lord and to our Church, and we are blessed by their ministry.

We are called to support their ongoing formation, and to care for the needs of our priests throughout their retirement years.

Additionally, we are called to provide support for the missionary and international priests who serve our parishes, as well as our seminarians preparing for priesthood.

The *Vibrant Ministries* -- *Uniting our Church* appeal has set as a monetary goal a sum of \$3,940,500, which will go toward support of priestly vocations from seminary through retirement.

SEMINARIANS: We have six seminarians currently in formation at an annual cost of \$38,000 per seminarian per year.

RETIRED PRIESTS: There are currently 11 retired priest and two retired bishops supported through pensions, health coverage and long-term care coverage. With nine priests over age 60, estimates for future long-term care coverage is estimated at \$1.3 million.

MISSIONARY PRIESTS: There are currently 15 priests from nine diocese and religious orders receiving support and retirement benefits funding of approximately \$90,000 per year.

ONGOING FORMATION: Ongoing formation includes support for language studies, retreats, advanced education, and leadership programs.
